





Introduction to Computers-Wednesday, 5/26-6/16, 2:00-3:00PM-This course is ideal for those who have limited to no experience with computers. Topics covered include: the mouse and keyboard, the difference between hardware and software, and an overview of computer programs.

Introduction to the Internet and E-Mail-Wednesday 6/23-7/14, 2:00-3:00PM-This course is for those who have taken Introduction to Computers, or those who already have a general understanding of how to use a computer. Topics covered include: introduction to the Internet and email, how to use an Internet Browser, sending and receiving emails and email attachments, and keeping your computer safe on the Internet.

Internet Services-Wednesday 7/21-8/4, 2:00-3:00pm-This course is for those who have taken Introduction to Computers and Introduction to the Internet and Email, or those who already have a general understanding of how to use a computer and the Internet. Topics can change to reflect the needs of the class, but previous topics have included: searching for information on the Internet, dealing with pop-ups and advertisements, computer terminology and finding directions on the Internet.

Genealogy Resources

Genealogy is fast becoming the second most popular hobby after gardening in the United States. The Meredith Public Library has many resources to help you, including a monthly Genealogy Club that meets the first Friday of every month at 4PM. May 7 we will be discussing DNA testing and Genealogy and June 4 we will have guest genealogist Deborah Moore discuss the Society of Mayflower Descendants including what it takes to become a member, what resources are available through them and what is available at NH Vital Records.

We have several genealogy databases. Two are only accessible via the library on our PCs or on your own laptop. Ancestry.com allows you to search Census records, military records, passenger lists and MUCH more. New England Ancestors includes many New England based databases but their most popular one is the MA Vital Records from colonial days through 1915. Our third database, HeritageQuest, can be accessed from home via our Website at www.meredithlibrary.org. Ask for a bookmark during your next library visit for the username and password or give us a call and we'll give it to you over the phone.
