

Killer Weekend is an intelligent, tightly-written story with short chapters, crisp dialogue and a refreshing twist. Ridley Pearson's latest novel is a high-altitude, high-octane thriller about murder, greed, betrayal and revenge, but it also includes a welcome shot of redemption, sacrifice and forgiveness.


Friends of the Library Meeting, Thursday**, October 28, 2010 at 3:00 PM

drews, you are sure to find something with which to curl up by a warm fire. Feel free to suggest authors for this space.




